Advent Week 2: PEACE

Text for the Week: Isaiah 11:1-10 – The Peaceable Kingdom



... *The Spirit of the Lord will rest on him—the Spirit of wisdom and of understanding,...*

He will not judge by what he sees with his eyes, or decide by what he hears with his ears; but with righteousness he will judge the needy, with justice he will give decisions for the poor of the earth....

The wolf will live with the lamb, the leopard will lie down with the goat, the calf and the lion and the yearling together; and a little child will lead them. The cow will feed with the bear, their young will lie down together, and the lion will eat straw like the ox. The infant will play near the cobra's den, and the young child will put its hand into the viper's nest. They will neither harm nor destroy on all my holy mountain, for the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea...



A Summary of the Text:

Isaiah paints quite the picture here: wolves living with lambs, children playing safely near snakes, natural enemies sitting down to share meals together. To be very clear—this isn't about ignoring real danger or pretending that enemies suddenly don't exist. That would be foolish. No, this is about imagining a world where the things that threaten us lose their power to harm. And here's what's really interesting—notice how Isaiah starts. He begins by describing a leader who judges fairly for the poor and oppressed. Peace begins with justice. That's not something to gloss over.

Reflection:

Peace might feel like some kind of luxury when someone's just trying to make it through each day. Fair enough! But here's the thing about the peace that Isaiah describes: Peace is not the *absence of conflict*. Peace is about the *presence of justice*. And what does that look like? It's de-escalating tension before it boils over. It's making a choice to not retaliate when provoked, even though every fiber inside you wants to strike back. Peace means knowing people can change for the better, but that we are not obligated to suffer while they figure out their own issues. Sometimes peace means prioritizing our safety through boundaries and distance. Isaiah doesn't say that peace will come all at once. He says that those predators and prey can learn to coexist. In Isaiah's vision, peace starts with deliberate steps toward safety and the reduction of violence. Even so, it may still be that the chaos we sometimes see in the world around us might be beyond anyone's control. But each choice we make not to add fuel to that fire, *that is building peace step by step*. Those small actions do make a difference.
